Closing date for applications: The closing date for applications is six weeks after the publication date.

Duties:

Under the supervision of the Director and the Deputy Director:

1. To organise, co-ordinate and direct staff and work of the Economics and Environment Division which consists of two sections: a) Economic Analysis of Relations with Developing Countries and b) Environment and Development Assistance.

a) Economic Analysis of Relations with Developing Countries

i) To contribute to the identification and analysis of key economic and development issues in major areas of the developing world and their implications for the evolving relationship between OECD countries and the various categories of developing countries and for effective development co-operation policies.

ii) To prepare policy papers for submission to the Development Assistance Committee on these questions and to other relevant OECD bodies, notably in connection with preparations for major international meetings concerned with economic relations between developed and developing countries.

b) Environment and Development Assistance

i) To monitor the evolution of analysis and discussion on development/environment issues of both a global and national character, in the environmental economics profession and in international fora and to contribute to the development of thinking on these issues in the OECD.

ii) To prepare policy papers for submission to the DAC Working Party on Development Assistance and Environment on environmental issues and management in developing countries and related development assistance policies.

Principal qualifications :

1. Excellent university degree in economics with specialisation in international economics.
2. Combination of substantial experience in analytical and policy aspects of international economic relations, particularly with respect to relations between developed and developing countries and good analytical and practical knowledge of environmental issues. Specific work experience in development co-operation policies and programmes would be an advantage.
3. Proven ability to design and supervise policy-oriented research of a multi-disciplinary character.
4. Demonstrated excellent drafting ability in either English or French, with a good working knowledge of the other language.
